After graduation I came back home and got enrolled in welding school and just graduated this past June . 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Our cadets say that the food at MCA is one of their **favorite** things here. Here is one of their favorite recipes, straight from the DFAC!

Hotteok

1 qt and 1 cup of All Purpose Flour

2 TBSP Yeast

1 TBSP and 1 tsp Granulated Sugar

2 cups 1% Milk

½ cup of Water

2 ½ TBSP Kosher Salt

3 ½ cup of Light Brown Sugar

¾ cup of Pecans

1 TBSP and 1 tsp Cinnamon

Heat water and milk to 95 degrees.

In a mixing bowl, combine flour, sugar and yeast.

Add heated milk to dry ingredients.

After mixing for a minute or 2, add salt. Continue to knead for 5 minutes. Remove from the mixing bowl and allow to raise. Dough will be soft, but should not be overly sticky.

Mix sugar, cinnamon and nuts.

Portion dough into 2 ounce balls, flatten and fill with 2 tablespoons of sugar mixture.

Gather the edge of the dough and pinch shut.

Fry with oil in a skillet or deep fryer.
